Friends of Fort Caswell Rifle Range plan Wall of Honor for World War I military

The nonprofit Friends of Fort Caswell Rifle Range Inc. is working on a project to honor men and women who served in the Great War and appealing to the public for support to send pictures of relatives, or Doughboys as they were called, who served in World War I.

For the last four years, the organization has worked toward stabilizing and preserving a 1918 rifle range on Caswell Beach listed on the National Register of Historic Places. It once was a non-contiguous part of Fort Caswell.

"If you have a family member that served in any branch of the military during World War I, men and women, from any state, we welcome your help," Norma Eckard, president of Friends of Fort Caswell Rifle Range, said in a news release. "Send a copy of a photograph of your family member in uniform, their rank, unit/division, any stories about them and the war. List the state where they signed up and/or where they lived."

The friends are making a Wall of Honor to display military photographs during fundraisers and special occasions, especially the fourth annual Kentucky Derby set for Saturday, May 7, at the Caswell Dunes clubhouse. A commemorative event is in the planning for the rifle range Centennial year in 2018.

Within the month, engineers will begin evaluating the structure and recommending stabilization repairs. In addition, an arborist will identify trees that are damaging the walls and proceed to remove them. After that, the engineers will prioritize the work for continuing the stabilization of the structure. Once the stabilization is complete, recommended permanent repairs can be made while maintaining the historical qualities of the original architecture.
